THE RETURN O' THOMAS


We all know the myths and legends behind the man who was Thomas the Rhymer, the famous Borders' Man.

HELLO FROM THE MANSE

This is one of my favourite Christmas pictures with Rosie standing outside a wonderfully decorated house for Christmas. There is however something wrong with this picture, it is not real, although Rosie is! The picture was taken inside a shop, and is a display piece, with a picture of Rosie inserted.

All of which had me wondering about how we can tell in our very modern society what is real and what is not about history. There are those who would debate whether



that first Christmas happened, but if you were to really take the time to ponder, you would I am sure come to the same conclusion as Christians and believe that it is true. It is what we call having faith.

The events leading up to the birth of Jesus are written, they are known in history, at a time when there was no such thing as 'fake news,' or 'Al' which can make anything look real. Why would the historians, writing at the time, make up the birth of Jesus? The prophets foretold his coming – Isaiah especially notes in chapter 9 from verse 6:





For 16 years, a small four-legged friend walked the halls of the dementia specialist care home, St Margaret's House in Polmont. Rosie first came to St Margaret's House at 12 weeks old, along with her twin sister Amber. The pair were loved by many and



known as "professional beggars" with a passion for pink wafers. Rosie was left to carry out her care dog duties alone when Amber passed away from cancer in 2021, aged 15. Over the years, she brought joy to the residents. On the days she was not there, her absence was noticeable with residents expressing they missed her.

Her skilled begging tactics never deteriorated with age as she welcomed all visitors cheerfully whilst leading them to the office where her treats were kept. Sadly, Rosie passed away peacefully in August 2023, aged 16. However, her years of dedicated service will not be forgotten nor will her impact on the atmosphere of the home and the joy she brought to those that met her.

GREETINGS FROM PRESBYTERY CLERK

Lothian & Borders Presbytery

People might be surprised but one of the most democratic institutions in the land is the Church of Scotland. We are Presbyterian which means decisions are made by groups of people gathered from each of the congregations. When the grouping is national it is called a General Assembly, regionally a Presbytery and locally a Kirk Session. Each person has the same authority and one vote, so a person in the job for one month carries the same authority as a person who has served for 20 years. Decisions are on the basis of majority vote though often it is clear what people want without voting. Traditionally this was indicated by stamping feet.

Lots of the Kirk's tradition and language can seem strange. For instance, we use 'deliverance' instead of 'motion' when making proposals. Intimations are notices, benedictions are blessings and the grace is how we say 'God Bless You' at the end of a meeting.

Yet for all that the Kirk has stood with the people of Scotland since this version of it came into being in

1690. Consider that it was the Kirk that championed free education for everyone also the Kirk that was at the forefront of fighting for social change. That is because the Kirk has hard wired into it the command of Jesus to love God and love your neighbour.

This new Presbytery of Lothian & Borders is wired exactly the same way. Our job is to help congregations put those commands into practice. This might be through conferences and courses or helping congregations navigate the weirdness of church tradition and law. Always though it is about love God and love your neighbour. What help do you need to live out these commands in your church and community?

Advent resources raise money for Church of Scotland HIV Programme

A new biblical resource for Advent aims to help burdened ministers and worship leaders while raising funds for the Church of Scotland HIV Programme. The story-based document, titled 'Illuminating Christmas', can be adapted as a resource for Bible study groups, Sunday services, school assemblies and other settings, with materials which can be helpful for congregations which run worship teams.



The creator of the resources, Rev Dr Robin Hill, minister at Gladsmuir linked with Longniddry, said the pack aims to see congregations 'through every Sunday in December and into January' to help worship leaders struggling with the busyness of the season. He said: "Advent is always hectic, The document helps users to think about Advent but also where it's leading, with two additional stories for Christmas Day and Epiphany."



Each week's material is supported by an accompanying image by Katie Hill, a theology graduate and illustrator. Her pictures can be downloaded by churches for presentations and printouts, all free of charge.

Though the resource is free, congregations who use it are invited to donate to the Church of Scotland HIV Programme, which supports a variety of project partners throughout the world.

Glory to GOD in the highest and on earth peace among men with whom HE is well pleased."

Luke 2 v 14

The above words were spoken by GOD'S angels just over 2000 years ago to humble shepherds who believed them and spread the news. About 33 years later, just before HIS death by crucifixion, JESUS said to those who loved HIM

In his own words, Billy Graham said "We could not see its flash, but we certainly felt its impact. People poured out into the streets and ran in the direction of the noise. We joined the crowd and soon came upon the dreadful sight."


Carnage! "We tried to bring some measure of comfort to the chaotic scene. Several of the people recognised me. I was not wearing clerical garb, of course, but they insisted on calling me 'Father,' begging me to give last rites to the dead and the dying. It was not a time for theological distinctions: I knelt by each one and prayed for them."

A few days later Billy Graham, in a meeting sponsored by both Catholic and Protestant chaplains, at Queen's University in Belfast, spoke to the students about the power of CHRIST to change lives and fill hearts with love. There was silence as each one listened attentively. Peace is not the absence of storm, it is the presence of CHRIST in the storm.

We will shortly celebrate the first Coming of THE PRINCE of PEACE who calls us to prayer.

"Almighty GOD, help us to be like those shepherds who believed and told others. May we kneel in our hearts before YOU and pray in love and faith that lives and hearts may be changed by the power of CHRIST. In HIS Name we pray. Amen.


